Glen Morris Just, 84, passed away peacefully in Purcell, Oklahoma, on February 25, 2026, surrounded by the comfort of the life he built and the family he loved. Born on January 17, 1942, in Collinsville, Oklahoma, to William and Leah (Flaming) Just, Glen grew up rooted in faith, hard work, and community—values that would shape the entirety of his life. He graduated from Collinsville High School in 1960 before earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture from Oklahoma State University, beginning a lifelong dedication to the land and to serving others. Glen spent many meaningful years in Collinsville, where he farmed and later founded a real estate and appraisal business. His steady integrity and work ethic earned the trust of neighbors and clients alike.
